The name of the college is changed to Beirut College for Women (BCW).



2009

LAU acquires majority holdings of Hôpital Rizk, and begins developing the Lebanese American University Medical Center-Rizk Hospital (LAUMC-RH).



LAU is granted full accreditation by the New England Commission of Higher Education (NECHE).

The School of Engineering's undergraduate programs and the School of Arts and Sciences' BS in Computer Science receive accreditation by the Engineering Accreditation Commission (ABET).



1950

New buildings are completed and named in honor of early leaders: Frances Irwin, Winifred Shannon and James Nicol. The Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York grants BCW a provisional charter.



1955

BCW is granted an absolute charter.



The dormitory building is named in honor of BCW presidents Rhoda Orme and Frances Gray.



1973

The college becomes co-educational and changes its name to Beirut University College (BUC).



1985

The board of Regents in New York amends the charter to transform the college into a multi-campus institution.



2010

The Alice Ramez Chagoury School of Nursing welcomes its first class.



2011

The Frem Civic Center is inaugurated on the Byblos campus.



2012

LAU acquires Gezairi Transport's former headquarters to host the School of Architecture and Design.



2013

1965

LAU's New York HQ and Academic Center is inaugurated in midtown Manhattan.



The BS in Nursing is accredited by the Collegiate Commission on Nursing Education (CCNE).



The LAU Executive Center@Solidere opens in downtown Beirut.



1991

Classes begin on the Byblos campus.



1994

The Board of Regents approves the new name of Lebanese American University, and the charter is amended to include master's degrees.

LAU has four schools: Arts and Sciences, Business, Engineering and Architecture, and the School of Pharmacy, inaugurated this year.



1999

The Lebanese government grants LAU a license to operate a medical school and a nursing school.



2002

The PharmD program becomes the only one outside the United States to earn accreditation by the Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education (ACPE).



2004

After extensive renovations funded by the Safadi Foundation, the Safadi Fine Arts Building in Beirut is re-dedicated.



2014

The Gilbert and Rose-Marie Chagoury Health Sciences Center is inaugurated to host the schools of Medicine, Pharmacy and Nursing.



2016

The newly-named Adnan Kassar School of Business receives accreditation from the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB).

In 2009, LAU was granted accreditation by the New England Commission of Higher Education (NECHE) for a five-year period and reaccredited in 2014 for an additional 10 years. With roots extending back more than 180 years, the institution has a long history in serving the needs of Lebanon and the Middle East.

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





FINANCIAL AID & SCHOLARSHIPS

LAU provides a comprehensive meritand need-based financial aid program. Eligible students receive packages commensurate with an assessment of their academic and financial status.

For the 2019-2020 academic year, LAU increased its financial aid budget by **5** percent. Over **\$37,889,064** funded approximately **4,824** students in AY2018-2019.

A total of **94** students received merit scholarships while **95** received a Middle East Partnership Initiative (MEPI) grant in fall 2018. Additionally, **211** incoming LAU students were awarded entrance scholarships in fall 2018.



TUITION

For the academic year 2019-2020, the average undergraduate tuition amount is \$20,172 per year and the average graduate tuition is \$13,349 per year.

Annual tuition fees for doctoral-professional practice programs amount to \$33,822 for students in the school of medicine, and \$26,400 for PharmD students.

- The Bachelor of Engineering programs in Civil, Computer, Electrical, Industrial and Mechanical Engineering are all accredited by the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology (ABET) (www.abet.org).
- The Bachelor of Science in Computer Science is accredited by the Computing Accreditation Commission of ABET (www.abet.org).

- The Bachelor of Science in Nursing is accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) (www.aacn.nche.edu/ccne-accreditation).
- The Adnan Kassar School of Business is accredited by the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB) (www.aacsb.edu/about). It offers the following programs: BS in Business, BS in Economics, BS in Hospitality and Tourism Management, MA in Applied Economics, MBA, MS in HRM, LLM and Executive MBA.
- The National Architectural Accrediting Board (NAAB) has recently granted continuing candidacy of the **Bachelor of Architecture** as of 2018 (www.naab.org). The Bachelor of Architecture degree is officially recognized by the French government, as equivalent to the Diplôme d'État d'Architecte, the professional diploma entitling its holders to practice and apply for professional licensure.




FACULTY

LAU's campuses provide an attractive, safe and sustainable environment, with the following amenities and features:

- State-of-the-art libraries
- Recreational and athletics areas accommodating cafeterias, cyber cafes, student lounges, music rooms, recreational rooms, swimming pool, indoor and outdoor basketball and tennis courts, gymnasiums, dance studios, multipurpose activities rooms, and fitness centers

LAU's campuses offer similarly structured programs in the arts, sciences and business. The nursing and medicine programs, as well as junior and senior engineering and pharmacy courses, are offered exclusively in Byblos.





The **Beirut campus** is located in Quraytem, Ras Beirut, in the vicinity of Hamra. Extending over **27,500 square meters** of land, it incorporates a mix of old sandstone buildings and modern architecture.

The **Byblos campus** is situated approximately **43 kilometers** from Beirut, in the hillside Blat district, overlooking the ancient city of Byblos and the Mediterranean Sea. The site has developed steadily since its inception in 1987, reaching **317,643 square meters** and hosting LAU's seven schools.




LAU New York Headquarters and Academic Center was inaugurated in September 2013 in a historic move reflecting the university's aim to serve as a bridge between the United States and the Middle East.

The **2,400-square-meter** facility, located in **Midtown Manhattan**, is spread across **three** floors housing **10** classrooms, business and admissions offices, and a library. It is also home to University Advancement staff.

As the first of its kind for any Middle
East-based university, the center is making
progress on its mission to facilitate
cross-cultural exchange by regularly
hosting public lectures, book discussions,
performances, workshops, and conferences
involving leading scholars and artists.

The center presents a unique opportunity for American students to gain insight into Lebanon and the Middle East under a familiar educational system. It also serves as a hub for LAU students wishing to visit New York and gain first-hand exposure to businesses, industries, executives and thought-leaders.



Conceived and designed in collaboration with Harvard Medical International, the **Gilbert and Rose-Marie Chagoury School of Medicine** offers a multidisciplinary American-model curriculum that fosters critical thinking, promotes lifelong learning, and employs new pedagogical evaluation and assessment tools.

The school prepares students for the challenges of real-world situations through its many resources, including the school's cutting-edge Clinical Simulation Center and its clinical and basic sciences research lab. Furthermore, students can gain training and earn scholarships through the school's local and international affiliations in research and clinical medicine.

The school's main clinical training center is the LAU Medical Center-Rizk Hospital and the LAU Medical Center-St John's Hospital (planned for summer 2020). LAU's medical students also train with a number of health facilities through affiliation/agreement arrangements.


The Alice Ramez Chagoury School of Nursing's comprehensive curriculum emphasizes professional nursing standards, patient-centered care, and ethical practice. Built on a liberal arts foundation, the curriculum complements nursing science with knowledge from the biomedical and social sciences, thereby allowing graduates to pursue licensure as registered nurses in Lebanon and around the world.

Demonstrating the school's excellence, the majority of nursing students are hired immediately upon graduation in top hospitals and NGOs across Lebanon, while others go on to pursue their graduate studies in high-ranking universities in Lebanon and abroad.

The School of Pharmacy offers unique educational programs that emphasize biomedical, pharmaceutical, social, behavioral, administrative and clinical sciences, as well as soft skills and service learning, all of which are essential to better serve patients and the community. Over the past five years, pharmacy graduates have maintained an average pass rate of 91 percent on the North American Pharmacy Licensing Exam (NAPLEX®) and 100 percent on the Lebanese National Competency Assessment Examination (Colloquium). Graduates are well-placed to pursue graduate studies, postgraduate residencies, or work in diverse fields such as community and hospital pharmacies, clinical settings, pharmaceutical sales, pharmaceutical industry, and academia.



LAU Medical Center-RH is designed to support LAU's Schools of Medicine, Nursing, and Pharmacy by providing clinical facilities and services for teaching and training.

The hospital also caters to students enrolled in the nutrition program at the School of Arts and Sciences. Together, the university and the hospital are home to 77 full-time and 130 part-time physicians. The hospital houses the first and only Comprehensive Stroke Center in Lebanon.

LAU is in the process of transforming this medical campus in Beirut from a city hospital into a modern university hospital, clinical teaching venue, and research institution. These major renovations are part of a master plan in progress and expected to be completed by 2024. In addition, LAU has signed an agreement with St John's Hospital in Jounieh, which is due to open in summer 2020.





The **Graduate Studies & Research (GSR)** office supports the LAU community in developing a range of programs and managing grant-seeking projects, to establish LAU as a regionally and internationally recognized institution for research and graduate education.

The GSR office assists faculty and students with grant development, data analysis, and the promotion of novel discoveries along with associated patents and copyrights.

The office also hosts innovative interdisciplinary graduate programs in strategic areas.

Through the university's vibrant student life, students develop leadership skills and community awareness as well as grow academically, intellectually, and socially. Student life includes various extracurricular activities, clubs, athletic and sporting events, and academic groups.



ACTIVITIES

Coordinated by the Office of the Dean of Students, a range of activities and clubs include everything from culture and sports to human rights and the arts. These provide students with outlets to enjoy their hobbies, and to interact with their community and help develop entrepreneur, civic and leadership skills.

ATHLETICS

The LAU Athletics Office holds intercollegiate, intramural, and international tournaments, in addition to arranging students' participation in local, regional, and international events.

Athletic and varsity sports include basketball, soccer, futsal, volleyball, swimming,

Taekwondo, and tennis among many others.

The office also organizes competitions for high-school students (including the Junior NBA League).





Social responsibility is second nature to the LAU community. Across its seven schools, the university offers **40** courses with content directly related to citizenship, ethics and sustainability. In collaboration with national and international organizations, LAU actively promotes gender equality, human rights, educational equity, healthcare and environmental conservation, among others.

During AY2018-2019, students took part in close to **68** formal community service events and activities, apart from countless food and clothes drives, and fundraisers for the underprivileged.

The Outreach and Civic Engagement
Department (OCE) matches students
with 60 partner NGOs year-round, for
volunteering and internship opportunities.

Many of these organizations, in turn, offer workshops and trainings for LAU students.

LAU owns the exclusive rights to organize Global Classrooms International Middle and High School Conferences in New York City. **Four** simulation programs have quickly become LAU staples:

During this year, more than **6,700** delegates from across Lebanon have flocked to LAU's Beirut and Byblos campuses, as well as the New York Academic Center, to take part in these programs.



OFFICE OF INTERNATIONAL SERVICES

The Office of International Services (OIS) links LAU to more than **1,000** partner institutions across Europe, Australia and North America.

LAUers have the chance to grow their educational journey through a unique learning opportunity away from their comfort zone. Similarly, dozens of international students flock to LAU campuses every year to add an edge to their academic and cultural knowledge.

Apart from a supportive team of faculty and staff, international students are matched with campus "buddies" – a group of student volunteers who guide them through day-to-day life within the community, both on and off campus.

SINARC ARABIC LANGUAGE AND CULTURE PROGRAM

SINARC, the Arabic language and culture program at LAU, offers intensive courses in modern standard Arabic and the Levantine dialect at all levels. The program's unique success is due to its reliance on three pillars: academic rigor, cultural immersion and personalized attention.

Classes are offered year-round on LAU's Beirut campus with up to 15 transferable credits per semester. In addition, the six-week Intensive Summer Program allows students to immerse themselves in the language and culture, travel to historic and cultural sites around Lebanon, and earn up to eight transferable credits. Students can also join

LAU volunteers working with dozens of NGOs engaged in relief work across the country. SINARC also offers specialized one-on-one packages for the diplomatic corps.

LAU's New York Headquarters offers classes in standard Arabic and dialect for all levels on a for-credit or non-credit basis.
