LAU acquires majority holdings of Hôpital Rizk, and begins developing the Lebanese American University Medical Center-Rizk Hospital. The Gilbert and Rose-Marie Chagoury School of Medicine welcomes its first class of students.

The name of the college is changed to Beirut College for Women (BCW).



1955

BCW is granted an absolute charter by the State of New York.


The LAU Medical Center-Saint John's Hospital in Keserwan/Byblos area is inaugurated.

In 2009, LAU was granted accreditation by the New England Commission of Higher Education (NECHE) for a five-year period and reaccredited in 2014 for an additional 10 years. 


FINANCIAL AID & SCHOLARSHIPS

LAU provides a comprehensive meritand need-based financial aid program. Eligible students receive packages commensurate with an assessment of their academic and financial status.

In 2021–2022, over **\$82.7 million** were distributed to **6,518** students in the form of merit scholarships and need-based aid.

A total of **133** students received merit scholarships while **242** received a Middle East Partnership Initiative (MEPI) grant. Additionally, **651** incoming LAU students were awarded entrance scholarships.

For the academic year 2022–2023, the university has allocated an unprecedented \$100 million to support students through Lebanon's financial crisis



TUITION


In the academic year 2021–2022, the average undergraduate tuition amount was \$20,124 per year and the average graduate tuition was \$13,422 per year. Annual tuition fees for doctoral-professional practice programs amount to \$33,822 for students in the school of medicine, and \$26,400 for PharmD students.

FACULTY

Out of **592** full-time faculty members, **87** percent hold doctorates or the highest degree in their field. The approximate student–faculty ratio on both campuses is **10:1**.

LAU's campuses provide an attractive, safe and sustainable environment, with the following amenities and features:

The **Beirut campus** is located in Quraytem, Ras Beirut, in the vicinity of Hamra. Extending over **27,500 square meters** of land, it incorporates a mix of old sandstone buildings and modern architecture.

The **Byblos campus** is situated approximately **43 kilometers** from Beirut, in the hillside Blat district, overlooking the ancient city of Byblos and the Mediterranean Sea. The site has developed steadily since its inception in 1987, reaching **317,643 square meters** and hosting LAU's seven schools.






LAU New York Headquarters and Academic Center was inaugurated in September 2013 in a historic move reflecting the university's aim to serve as a bridge between the United States and the Middle East.

The **2,400-square-meter** facility, located in **Midtown Manhattan**, is spread across **three** floors housing **10** classrooms, business and admissions offices, and a library. It is also home to University Advancement staff.

As the first of its kind for any Middle East-based university, the center is known for facilitating cross-cultural exchange by regularly hosting public lectures, book discussions, performances, workshops, and conferences involving leading scholars and artists.




The school prepares students for the challenges of real-world situations through its many resources, including the school's cutting-edge Clinical Simulation Center and its clinical and basic sciences research lab. Furthermore, students can gain training and earn scholarships through the school's local and international affiliations in research and clinical medicine.

The school's main clinical training center is the LAU Medical Center-Rizk Hospital and the LAU Medical Center-Saint John's Hospital. LAU's medical students also train with a number of health facilities through affiliation/agreement arrangements.

Built on a liberal arts foundation, the curriculum complements nursing science with knowledge from the biomedical and social sciences, thereby allowing graduates to pursue licensure as registered nurses in Lebanon and around the world.

Demonstrating the school's excellence, the majority of nursing students are hired immediately upon graduation in top hospitals and NGOs across Lebanon, while others go on to pursue their graduate studies in high-ranking universities in Lebanon and abroad.

In 2019, 2020 and 2021, pharmacy graduates maintained a 100% pass rate on the North American Pharmacy Licensing Exam (NAPLEX®) and on the Lebanese National Competency Assessment Examination (Colloquium). Graduates are well-placed to pursue graduate studies, postgraduate residencies, or work in diverse fields such as community and hospital pharmacies, clinical settings, pharmaceutical sales, pharmaceutical industry, and academia.



LAU MEDICAL CENTER -RIZK HOSPITAL

LAU Medical Center-Rizk Hospital is designed to support LAU's Schools of Medicine, Nursing, and Pharmacy by providing clinical facilities and services for teaching and training. The hospital also caters to students enrolled in the nutrition program at the School of Arts and Sciences. The hospital houses the first and only Comprehensive Stroke Center in Lebanon.

LAU is in the process of transforming this medical campus in Beirut from a city hospital into a modern university hospital, clinical teaching venue, and research institution.

These major renovations are part of a master plan expected to be completed by 2024.

LAU MEDICAL CENTER -SAINT JOHN'S HOSPITAL

The newly inaugurated LAU Medical Center-Saint John's Hospital in the Jounieh/Byblos area adds enormous value to medical practice in a major part of the country. Managed and operated by LAU, it is the only university medical center in that region.

In addition to three advanced operating rooms and an OR in the Emergency Department, the 85-bed medical center offers the Jounieh/Byblos area the only stroke-ready facility with a state-of-the art interventional set-up and 160-slice CAT scanner for ultra-rapid evaluations. Notably, surgeries at the medical center can be transmitted live to anywhere in the world via video and sound.


LAU's libraries are well-equipped with spacious facilities that include:

OFFICE OF INTERNATIONAL SERVICES

The Office of International Services (OIS) links LAU to partner institutions across Europe, Australia and North America

LAUers have the chance to grow their educational journey through a unique learning opportunity away from their comfort zone. Similarly, dozens of international students flock to LAU campuses every year to add an edge to their academic and cultural knowledge.

Another internationally oriented program is **SINARC**, which offers intensive courses in modern standard Arabic and the Lebanese dialect at all levels.

The program owes its success to its reliance on academic rigor, cultural immersion and personalized attention.

Classes are offered year-round with transferable credits to the students' home institutions. The program allows students to immerse themselves in the language and culture and visit historic and cultural sites around Lebanon. Specialized one-on-one packages for the diplomatic corps are also offered.
